GOLF CARTS

Two years ago, my husband and I were going to be responsible and paint the interior of our house. One day, after receiving a several quotes,

my husband came home and said a golf cart would cost the same so what about buying one? I thought the idea was silly and frivolous. But, once the cart arrived, we have enjoyed countless evening drives with the family, saved gas by taking it to the pool, driven back and forth from my mother's house and I will say I do not regret the decision. I love seeing so many other golf carters tooling around the neighborhood and its fun that we have now incorporated them into parades a couple times during the year.

There are some golf cart naysayers in the neighborhood and some complaints are warranted. But, to keep the peace, I have listed all of the rules regarding golf carts in San Antonio that I have found on the TxDMV website.

- All golf carts need to be street legal, regardless of driving in a master planned community and not on major roadways.
- Street legal requirements seat belts, tail and head lights, horns, mirrors, speed monitors, parking break.
- Texas does not require golf cart insurance.
- Golf carts do not require license plates or need to be registered with the TxDMV.
- Golf carts do require a slow moving vehicle triangular emblem on the back of the cart.
- If driving at night, golf carts must have their lights on.
- Golf cart drivers are required to have a drivers license, or with adult supervision.

Golf carters, please be aware so you can adhere to the rules and we won't lose out on the everyday fun of the summer!

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Venomous Snakes in Texas

Texas is home to many species of venomous snakes. The most common venomous snake in Texas is the copperhead. Copperheads are named for their copper-colored heads and tails. They can be identified by their hourglass pattern on their backs and red eyes (which resemble a cat's eye). Copperhead bites are extremely painful but rarely deadly if treated quickly and even then, fatalities are very rare. Copperheads usually strike when people attempt to handle or kill them without knowing how to do so safely.

Other venomous snakes found in Texas include the cottonmouth, rattlesnake, coral snake, and western diamondback rattlesnake.

The following are some tips for avoiding contact with venomous snakes:

- Wear boots while walking through grassy areas where snakes may be hiding under rocks or logs.
- Walk on paved paths instead of grassy areas whenever possible.
- Keep your distance from any dead animals you come across while hiking or camping in wooded areas because they may have been killed by a snake and may attract other snakes to the area.
- Do not step into anything that you cannot see clearly at first glance such as holes or ditches since these are places where venomous snakes could be hiding.
- If bitten by a venomous snake, call 911 and seek medical attention immediately.

How To Water Less This Summer SAWS G

From creating shade to getting rid of some grass, there are a few ways to reduce your water use during the hottest, driest months of the year.

As the summer heat settles in, more and more water will be used to quench our thirsty lawns. Outdoor watering during our hottest months can account for 50 to 80 percent of a home's total water use, according to the Texas Water Development Board.

To help keep your water use in check this summer, try these water-wise gardening suggestions.

- **Create shade.** Nothing beats the Texas heat like a cool shady spot. Install a vine-laden pergola. Use crossvine, butterfly vine or San Antonio's favorite vine, queen's crown. Shady areas lose moisture at a much slower rate, reducing the need for frequent applications of water, even during the summer.
- Eliminate as much lawn as possible. Lawns use two to four times more water than native plants like Lantana and Salvia. Reducing the grass reduces the water.
- **Avoid over-fertilizing.** Frequent and heavy applications of fertilizer do help your lawn grow by leaps and bounds, but all that lush, new growth also results in grass that needs (you guessed it) more water.
- **Mulch.** One to two inches of hardwood, shredded cedar, or pine bark mulch will reduce weekly watering to just two per month.
- **Retire or retrofit irrigation zones.** You may qualify for the Residential Irrigation Design Rebate if you retire an unnecessary zone or your entire system, or convert pop-up spray zones to drip irrigation. Just call 210-704-SAVE to schedule a free irrigation consultation.

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How to use the Blue Recycling Cart

By San Antonio Solid Waste Management

The items you put in your blue cart matter, and it is also important how you put them in.

- Do not place recyclables in bags. They go into the blue cart loose.
- Flatten out all cardboard.
- Paper is accepted only if it is not food-soiled or otherwise unclean.
- Recyclables must be clean. If an item such as a peanut butter or honey jar cannot be rinsed out, it is better to put it in the brown trash cart.
- Remove all lids, even plastic ones. Those can be put in the brown trash cart.
- Never use your blue cart as overflow for trash.

Accepted Materials

Paper

- Cardboard (flattened)
- Dry goods packaging & drink boxes
- Newspaper & magazines
- Office paper & junk mail

Plastic

- Cups
- Kitchen & bath bottles & jugs
- Water & drink bottles (with caps on)
- Yogurt cups

Metal

- Aerosol cans (empty, no nozzles)
- Aluminum drink cans
- Metal food cans & lids

Glass

- Beverage bottles
- Food jars (lids removed)



Unaccepted Materials

- Aluminum foil
- Clothes hangers
- Clothing & shoes
- Diapers
- Garden hoses
- Hard plastic
- Household hazardous waste
- Napkins & paper towels
- Needles & medical waste
- Pizza & take-out boxes
- Shredded paper
- Styrofoam® packing
- Toys
- Wood & brush/yard waste

Watch for Tricky Items

- **Styrofoam (B** All Styrofoam must go in the brown trash cart. This material breaks apart in the recycling machinery during the process.
- **Diapers** Diapers, including adult diapers and pet pads, are trash. They must be picked out of the conveyor by hand which is dangerous and a health hazard. The City incurs a fee from the recycling facility for diapers.
- **Certain Types of Paper** Anything that is foiled, glittered or varnished is not accepted.
- **Tanglers** Examples of tanglers include hoses, cords, ropes, ribbons, string, and yarn. Tanglers are not accepted as they can get caught in gears at the recycling facility.
- Single-use plastic bags We recommend:
 - » Do not use them at all. Shop with reusable bags.
 - » Take them back to the retail store where you got them.
 - » Never put them loose in the blue recycling cart.
 - » It is better to place them in the brown trash cart.
- » They are accepted but only if several are bundled together into a ball. That bundle then goes into one single bag which should be tied, and the single bundle can go into the blue cart.





around swimming pools, hot tubs, and spas

For many of us, water activities equal fun. But it's important to be aware of electrical hazards while enjoying the water. Know how to be safe around swimming pools, hot tubs, and spas.

- If you are putting in a new pool, hot tub, or spa, be sure the wiring is performed by an electrician experienced in the special safety requirements for these types of installations.
- Outdoor receptacles must have covers that keep them dry even when appliances are plugged into them.
- Ground-fault circuit interrupters (GFCIs) are special devices designed to protect against electric shock and electrocution. They are required for most pool, spa, or hot tub equipment. They may be in the form of an outlet or a circuit breaker. Test the GFCIs monthly according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Electrical appliances, equipment, and cords should be kept at least 6 feet away from the water. When possible, use battery operated appliances and equipment, such as televisions, radios, and stereos.
- Avoid handling electrical devices when you are wet.
- Make sure that any overhead lines maintain the proper distance over a pool and other structures, such as a diving board. If unsure, contact a qualified electrician or your local utility company to make sure power lines are a safe distance away.
- Do not swim during a thunderstorm.
- Have a qualified electrician periodically inspect and where necessary—replace or upgrade the electrical devices or equipment that keep your pool, spa, or hot tub electrically safe.
- Have a qualified electrician show you how to turn off all power in case of an emergency.

KNOW THE RISKS!

Electrocution is death by an electrical shock. Be aware when skin is wet or when surrounding surfaces, such as the grass or pool deck, are wet. Wet skin or wet surfaces can greatly increase the chance of electrocution when electricity is present.

There are several signs of electrical shock. Swimmers may feel a tingling sensation. They may experience muscle cramps. They may not be able to move. They may feel as if something is holding them in place.

If you think someone in the water is being shocked, turn off all power, but do not attempt to go in the water. Use a fiberglass or other kind of rescue hook that doesn't conduct electricity to help the swimmer. Have someone call **9-1-1**.

If you think you are being shocked while in the water move away from the source of the shock. Get out of the water.

FACT

The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission has reports of 14 deaths related to electrocutions in swimming pools from 2003 to 2014. Hot tubs and spas may present the same hazard as swimming pools.



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
