Remember, your account needs to have a 0.00 balance (that includes the HOA fees that were due in January). If you have any trouble with the site, email contact@spectrumam.com and they can help.

Other exciting news is that our Pool House is being remodeled! The bathrooms, plumbing and lifeguard station are getting a facelift. We're also going to have access to the bathrooms from OUTSIDE the pool (with use of your keycard) – which will be great for our littles who are enjoying the park and don't want to go into the pool to go to the restroom.

Our SAFFE Officer, Arturo Castellanos, provided five tips about vehicle safety:

- Use a steering wheel lock.
- Hide your valuables from plain sight.
- Lock your vehicle and take your keys with you.
- Park in well-lit areas and well-attended parking lots.
- Never leave your vehicle running or unattended. It only takes seconds for a criminal to take your vehicle.

If you experience a burglary or see something illegal, don't post it to NextDoor only, email our SAFFE Officer at arturocastellanos@sanantonio.gov. You can also report suspicious activity to the non-emergency numbers (210-207-7273 or 210-335-4750).

SAPD has a new schedule of its Citizens on Patrol classes. If you would like to know how to support our officers by learning what to observe in our neighborhood and how we can take advantage of 311 services, consider this training. It's a 3-hour training class held at the substation at 13030 Jones Maltsberger put on by Officer Cathalina Schneider. Q: What is being done about the homeless population in our area?

A: We are all concerned about this issue. We do have a growing issue with several camps being set-up within our neighborhood area. It is hard on many when you see these individuals along the streets especially during the cold weather we have recently experienced. We all want to be a caring and giving community but we need to know the proper way to guide these individuals to the many resources available to them here in San Antonio.

SAFFE Officer Castellanos has been working with some homeless concerns at the old Salvation Army and woods behind the Home Depot. He has been in contact with both property owners to assist with cleanups on their property. He has made arrangements with his outreach team to work with assisting the homeless in the appropriate manner. He has issued criminal trespass warnings for both locations and will conduct an arrest if they violate the warning order.

His advice to us is that we do not offer money to any of these individuals. We are encouraged to contact 311, the nonemergency number at 210-207-7273, or 911 if it is an emergency.

Let's all work on this together. Your questions and concerns are ALWAYS greatly appreciated. Please come and join in at one of our monthly meetings at the community center on the third Tuesday of every month. It is always a win-win for our community when we have everyone getting involved.

2023 SCHOLARSHIP EPA ESSAY

REQUIREMENTS AND GUIDELINES

The Encino Park Women’s Club is a service organization that is offering a \$1200 scholarship this year. A committee of Women’s Club members will judge all entries. All applicants will be notified by mail.

Scholarship recipients will be recognized at the Women’s Club Awards Banquet on **May 8th**. Questions may be directed to Jeanne Morton @ 210-364-8325.

Encino Park Residents who meet the following requirements are encouraged to apply:

1. Applicant must have been an Encino Park resident for two years from the date of the application and be a member in good standing in the Encino Park Homeowner’s Association.
2. Individuals attending an accredited college or trade school for the 2023-24 academic year may apply. There is no age limit.
3. Applicant must submit an essay, a minimum of two (2) pages, double spaced and a maximum length of four (4) pages responding to the following:

“What is the greatest compliment you have ever been given and why was it meaningful to you?”

DO NOT PUT YOUR NAME ON YOUR ESSAY*

4. Applicants must submit a separate resume of his/her experiences including personal and academic achievements, grade point average (high school/college, if applicable), community involvement, extracurricular activities, and leadership positions, artistic and athletic achievements, and any outside employment. Include dates of membership in clubs as well as hours/time for each activity. References are not required but may be considered if submitted.

DO NOT PUT YOUR NAME ON YOUR RESUME*

5. An individual may receive our scholarship only once.
6. Applicant will write his/her name **only** on the attached “Scholarship Application” form.

Any application not complying with any of the above requirements will be disqualified.

Complete the scholarship application and attach it to your essay and resume. Your name should only appear on the Scholarship Application.

Place it in an 8x10 envelope marked “Scholarship” and **drop it off no later than 12 noon on Monday April 3rd**, at the Encino Park HOA office, 1923 Encino Rio, during office hours or in the HOA drop box when the office is closed. Only those applications received at the HOA office or in the drop box will be considered. **Remember* do not put your name on your resume or essay.**

This year, the first day of Spring falls on Monday, March 20, 2023, which is also the spring, or vernal equinox. The spring equinox occurs as the sun crosses the celestial equator vertically from south to north. Equinoxes occur only two times per year. Afterwards, the Northern Hemisphere begins to tilt towards the sun, giving us more hours of daylight. During this time, the Southern Hemisphere experiences the beginning of Autumn, as it is tilted away from the sun thereby providing less hours of daylight and more hours of night.

On February 2, 2023, the groundhog known as Punxsutawney Phil made his appearance in front of hundreds of witnesses thereby assuring us of six more weeks of winter. Statistically, Phil has predicted a long winter 78% of the time and has only been accurate 40% of the time. Additionally, Phil's predictions since 1887 show he is more likely to predict a longer winter and has only predicted an early spring 15% of the time.

Here in South Texas green grass is everywhere with roses blooming and flowers emitting their lovely fragrances. According to the USA National Phenology Network, the south usually experiences spring earlier than everyone else, however, this year,

it came 20 to 25 days earlier, which is remarkable because it has never occurred that early before. Average temperatures have been higher than 6 to 10 degrees above normal in South Texas. These extra warm temperatures make a huge difference for plants and animals which adds to their required number of growing days.

A global warming analysis illustrates that winters are warming up faster than any other season in the United States. In fact, over the past 50 years, the average temperature in winter has warmed by at least one degree Fahrenheit in every state. In addition, 70% of states have seen an increase in temperatures of at least 3 degrees Fahrenheit. Across the world, studies show that the length of winter is also shrinking.

Unfortunately, Phil the groundhog has not taken global warming into consideration in any of his predictions and would most likely be spot on if he had. Happy Spring everyone!

Watch Out for Oak Wilt!

Spring is the time of year when oaks are most susceptible to oak wilt, a deadly fungal disease that infects and disables the water-conducting system in oak trees. All oaks are susceptible, but some species are more so than others.

With no known cure, methods to control and treatments are expensive and not guaranteed. Here are some tips from our City Arborist for keeping oak wilt at bay.

- Minimize pruning oak trees between **February 1st and July 1st**. This is when the oak wilt fungus is most active.
- The best time to prune oak trees is either in the middle of the summer, when temperatures are the hottest, or in the late fall/early winter months when temperatures can be the coldest.
- Paint all cuts and wounds on oak trees within 30 minutes.
- Remove red oaks identified with oak wilt.
- Know where your firewood comes from. Don't transport unseasoned firewood from diseased red oaks.
- Make sure contractors doing tree pruning have a valid, city-issued tree maintenance license and proper training.



Disasters can happen anywhere and at any time. By taking the time to create an emergency supplies kit, your family will be prepared in the event of a disaster. The kit also helps children feel more secure knowing it is there in case of an emergency.

The supplies can be kept in a plastic tub, small suitcase, trash can, backpack or other container. To learn what else you need in an emergency supplies kit, go to www.ready.gov.

EMERGENCY SUPPLIES KIT:

- Water – one gallon per person per day for drinking and sanitation — store 3-day supply
- Ready-to-eat food, canned juices, comfort/stress foods — at least a 3-day supply
- Battery-powered or hand-cranked radio and a NOAA weather radio, and extra batteries for both
- Flashlights and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Non-prescription drugs such as pain reliever, anti-diarrhea medication, antacid, laxative
- Prescription medications, contact lenses and supplies, denture needs
- Whistle to signal for help
- Infant formula and diapers, if you have an infant
- Water and pet food if you have pets
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Dust mask or cotton t-shirt to filter the air
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape to shelter-in-place
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Can opener for food
- Aluminum foil
- A jacket or coat, hat and gloves
- A complete change of clothing including long pants, long sleeve shirt, and sturdy shoes stored in a waterproof container.
- Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person
- Rain gear
- Mess kits, paper cups, plates and plastic utensils
- Cash or traveler's checks, change
- Paper towels
- Tent
- Compass
- Matches in a waterproof container
- Signal flare
- Paper, pencil
- Personal hygiene items
- Soap
- Disinfectant and household chlorine bleach
- Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container. Remember to include emergency contact numbers.
- Passport, bank account numbers, credit card account numbers and companies
- Books, games puzzles, portable music device

NOTE: Replace food every six months. Re-think your kit and family needs once a year. Replace batteries and update clothes, etc.

My Personal Pack Checklist

Have children create their personal pack. Have them include things like their favorite book or stuffed animal. These familiar things will help keep them comfortable during an emergency.

- ✓ Change of clothes
- ✓ Blanket
- ✓ Books
- ✓ Favorite toy
- ✓ Paper, pencils and crayons
